WOTUS public comments extended

Farmers and ranchers now have until Sept. 27 to submit comments in support of the Environmental Protection Agency ditching the 2015 Waters of the U.S. rule. The rule, which was halted by the courts, had more to do with controlling land than protecting water and only created confusion for farmers.

The regulations were so broad the agency was able to blur the distinction between regulating water and land use, or in other words, allowed the agency to regulate land use even on land that was dry most of the time.

Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to submit their comments through the advocacy section of AFBF's website, fb.org.

Duarte case update

Farmers and ranchers have closely watched the case where John Duarte, a California farmer and Farm Bureau member, was sued by the Army Corps of Engineers after plowing a wheat field without a permit. The Corps argued Duarte disturbed protected wetlands by plowing. The case was settled in mid-August with Duarte agreeing to pay \$1.1 million in fines.

Don Parrish, senior director of regulatory relations at AFBF, discussed what the Duarte case settlement could mean for farmers and ranchers.

"This sends a couple of signals to farmers and ranchers that if you feel you are farming anywhere near a Waters of the U.S., (WOTUS) the government wants you to come in and ask if you can do tillage. That's something farmers have never had to do in the past. In my mind, now if farmers don't do that, they are at risk. That is a chilling result of what happened in this case. The other chilling thing is the new theory that if you plow and leave furrows, it's illegal. You are changing the hydrology of the site. I believe Congress had exempted these agricultural activities."

Parrish believes that CRP acreage could be kept out of production permanently due to the ruling.

Tax reform information from AFBF

Congress is back in session this month with a promise to work on tax reform. American Farm Bureau Federation tax specialist Pat Wolff says farmers need overall tax relief from Congress in any tax reform package.

"Farmers and ranchers need lower taxes overall, and in order for them to pay less taxes they need special tools that help them deal with the ups and downs of the farm economy," said Wolf. "There's a lot of talk about lowering business tax rates, but if rates are lowered and farmers lose things like cash accounting, like-kind exchanges, it could end up being a tax increase."

Wolff says there is a lot of talk about lowering corporate tax rates, but says business structures vary for farms, most of which are not incorporated. Other possible changes include priority items for agriculture.

"On the table are income tax rates, lower capital gains tax rates and possible elimination of the estate tax. All of those things are goals of Farm Bureau and would help farmers and ranchers," Wolff said.

To be decided is whether or not the tax reform bill will be revenue natural, meaning for every dollar cut, another tax will take its place.
